The college throughout the year is trying to fulfill the various activities reflecting the goals and objectives of the institution. The college has successfully implemented the scheme of remedial coaching classes for SC, ST Students. We inspire our faculties to participate in refresher/ orientation courses and various seminars, workshops and conferences at state, national and international level so that they must learn various new techniques and methods of teaching and learning process. 



4.2 Computerization of administration and library:

- We have established English Language Laboratory for the students to develop their communication abilities in English Language. To make them able to communicate with proper pronunciation and grammer. We have established this Laboratory with the assistance of U.G.C. The U.G.C. funded us the grant of Rs. 600000/- and the College Management contributed Rs. 52653/-. With these funds we purchased 21 Computer sets with 21 headphones, 21 Computer Booth/ Tables, 21 Chaires and ISN English Software. This software contains Phonetical chapters, Grammer Units and other essential unit of English Language units. The Lab. includes 'the EPSON Projector' and 'the Sony Home Theater Sound System' for exploring the various videos of grammer and literature. It enriches the teaching-learning process effectively.
- We have computers with internet access in the office and library where the teachers and the non-teaching staff use to access it as per their need.
- In the office we have "Tally Silver-9.2.6" by Tally Solution. We are using this software from 2006-07.

- Every year we use to purchase the Income Tax Software "e-tas-Software", windows MS-Office.
- Through computer laboratories for Commerce and Science departments, we provide computer education to the students through Wi-Fi connectivity. The students as well as the faculty use these laboratories occasionally.



5.2 Efforts made by the institution for tracking the progression





6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

Yes, we have Management System in our institute at two levels. First, we have Management Council that governs the institute totally. The Management Council appoints the Local Management Council that governs the college issues at primary level. The Principal, Professors and representatives of the professor in the management strive hard for the benefit of the college and the students so that the college can move ahead on the way of progress. Both the Councils put their control, observation and suggestions for the sound administration.

By the guidelines of the university we arrange internal assessment center in the college campus as a part of Home assessment for first year of all the faculties. Our teachers participate in the assessment process of the university as an Examiner, Moderator and even the CAP director as per the appointments given by the university.

Best Practices

Practice No. 01

It is an exceptional achievement of our Institute that we established **''Society Interaction Cell''** under the guidance and Chairmanship of Principal Dr.T.S.Birajdar. The cell tackles, suggests and guides the various society related activities to the various departments of the college. It monitors social activities in regard to the various issues like environment, health, education, agriculture, economy and superstitions in the arena of Dharangaon Tehsil. The stakeholders of this cell are the students, nearby village people and the various government offices.

In this year the cell suggested the following activities:

1. Title of the Practice:

"Life Time Education Cell"

2. Goal:

This cell is generally monitored and funded by the North Maharashtra Uviversitry, Jalgaon. But in this year the University grants are not allotted to the college. Hence we continued the cell and its activities on the self funded basis.

"Life Time Education Cell" works for:

- To empower the under privileged strata of the society by envisioning the awareness in regard to the various social issues like environment, health, education, agriculture, economy and superstitions, etc.
- ➤ To make the stakeholders like students, village people and the government authorities, responsible towards the social issues.

> To make the society empowered for the Nation Building.

3. The Context:

While designing and implementing the practice in this regard we thought about the social issues by focusing the rural arena of the Dharangaon Tehsil and its nearby villages. Through the discussion and visits to the village people with the help of our students, we found many problems and issues in regard to the rural life structure. They have the major issue of illiteracy because of which they are far away from the modern and safe life structure. They are not aware about their common Human Rights and Responsibilities. Hence the customs and traditions like Dowry, Illiteracy, Female Infant Killing, various types of Addictions and lack of the knowledge of modern ways of agriculture, etc. are found in the society. All these issues are the very negative impacts on the society and the life style of these village and rural people which are the stakeholders of our college.

Hence we decided to focus on these issues by arranging various types of awareness programmes like lectures of the Experts, awareness Camps and celebration of various Days by arranging road shows, drama and March, etc.

4. The Practice:

We arranged a lecture delivered by Mr. Vinayak Patil on "Sustainable Farming" at Toli and Bambhori villages. He talked about the issues like:

- Modern ways of farming;
- Seeds Plantation;
- Less use of chemicals and fertilizers;
- Relationship between organisms and their environment;
- Conservation of eco system;

- > Enhancement of environmental quality and the natural resources;
- Soil conservation, water management and harvesting, soil fertility;
- Selection of drought and disease tolerant species;
- Crop rotation;
- Market awareness;
- ➢ Dairy farming.

In this way Mr. Patil Vinayak, a modern farmer in his speech talked about all these above mentioned issues which are very important in the agriculture sector of these villages. His lectures are attended by our college students as well as the village peoples of Toli and Bambhori villages. The college students actively participated and enjoyed the sessions. They have put their feedbacks that though all these issues are the part of academic courses of some faculties must be taught as a compulsory subject to the every graduate student in our country since we are the agriculture nation.

Through the discussion of the students, the villagers and the experts it is found that there is vast scope for the work in this sector since the lack of knowledge and awareness regarding modern ways of farming, selection of seeds, time management in plantation and marketing of the crop production.

The session proved that we have miles to go in this sector of agriculture so that we can compete with the world and can achieve the target of self dependency in food security and it can be achieved only through the research and major role played by our higher education institutions like colleges and universities.

5. Evidence of Success:

This practice proved very fruitful for the stakeholders like the college students and village people. They actively participated in the sessions by asking various questions and suggestions. They clarified their curries in regard the agriculture issues. Such seminars and workshops are organized by the government and non government authorities for the sustaining development of the agriculture sector. But many times it seems to be happened that there is no any proper interaction between the organizers and the farmers. But the sessions arranged by our institute proved very successful because of the active participation of ours students who are the part of organizers i.e. our institute as well as the villages also. Most of the students of our institute are from rural and agricultural background so they proved the mediator between the organizers and the farmers because of which the farmers strongly and positively participated in the sessions and got the proper guidance through the sessions.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

Before this year the 'Life Long Education Cell' was funded by the university, but this year we didn't get any funds so we managed by our own at Institutional level and arranged the various programmes successfully.

At the Human level we faced the problem in the earlier stage but afterward we came over to this problem with the help of our students. They became the communication line up between the Institute and the stakeholder farmers. It became easy for our students to convey the farmers for the participation in the Institutional activities because the most of the students are from agricultural background. They have to convince most of the time to their parents only who are farmers.

Practice No. 02

1. Title of the Practice:

"Veterinary Check up Campaign"

- 2. Goal:
 - To help rural community to deal with health related problems in livestock through organizing animal health awareness camp. Animal health awareness camps will also help in enhancing milk production and dealing with infertility problems
 - To find out the general health status of livestock, detection of prevalent diseases and suggesting as well as providing preventive measures to protect cattle and to better milk production.
 - To generate awareness about animal health to improve the socioeconomic status of rural poor.

3. The Context:

Dairy sector plays an important role as a subsidiary source of income in addition to agriculture for the rural masses in India. In case of Dharangaon Tahsil, its importance increases manifold as agriculture and dairy is the major source of livelihood for large number of people. Dharangaon Tahsil has large number of cattle. But due to various factors, milk production in Dharangaon Tahsil is not commensurate with the number of cattles. In other words, milk productivity is low. Cattle owners face other challenges which make this sector unviable from economic point of view. These challenges are rising input costs, medical costs infertility problems etc. Veterinary services costs and infertility problems in livestock are major factors responsible for making this sector unviable, when done at small scale. It has been found that if medical expenses can be significantly brought down and significant increase in milk productivity can be achieved, if some simple preventive measures are taken and some regular practices are adopted. In similar manner infertility problems can be taken care of by proper Veterinary treatment. Veterinary department of Dharangaon Tahsil is proposing to help rural community to deal with health related problems in livestock through organizing animal health awareness camp. Besides that, these animal health awareness camps also help in enhancing milk production and dealing with infertility problems. These camps will be conducted on adapted village Bambhori with the help of NSS volunteers.

4. The Practice:

Spreading awareness about the animal health camp and its benefits among the community is an important part of the strategy. Proper spreading of message will enable sizeable number of community member to take benefits of animal health camp. These camps were organized with collaboration of veterinary department of civil hospital Dharangaon and NSS Department. Awareness among community spread through leaflet distribution by students and rally. In every camp special emphasis will be given on infertility related problems as solving these problems can result in substantial increase in milk production. Data about the infertility was collected in the camp itself depending upon the findings of these camps.

5. Evidence of Success:

About 169 farmers participated very actively and enthusiastically in the camp. Already the participant farmers were known most of the animal related problems and diseases but through the camp they came to know the technical aspects as well as solutions to their problems. They came to know the scientific analysis and causes of the animal diseases.


6.Problems Encountered and Resources Required:


While organising the camp people were not approaching properly to us. They were thinking that these people have government scheme with them so were deserving something else from our team. But our students and the medical experts convinced them by anyhow. As the students were from the nearby villages, it became easy for them to talk with the village people.

While organising the camp we faced lot of problems regarding the knowledge and awareness in the village people. There was lack of basic infrastructural facilities. People talked about the communication with various government medical departments. They told us about the lack of medical experts and even quality medicines. All these things have to be set properly.
